Framing Questions

1. What are the elements for a high quality of life for *ALL* our residents?

Elements of a high-quality of life.

- safe housing for all residents
- livable wages for all households
- residents engaged in community
- neighborhoods that work

Framing Questions

2. What makes a healthy region?

Elements of a healthy region:

- broad, resilient job market
- quality schools, technical schools, universities/colleges
 - effective transit system
- valued natural resources

Framing Questions

3. What contributes to a vibrant economy?

Elements of a vibrant economy:

- flexible, comprehensive educational system
- engaged business community
- skilled, motivated workforce
- supportive infrastructure

Framing Questions

4. Why is it important for the region to have a strong sense of place?

Elements of a strong sense of place.

- residents committed to improving their communities, building a legacy for future generations
 - residents have ties to broader region and pride in where they live and work

Framing Questions

5. What is essential infrastructure and what are essential regional services? How do we move toward fair access to these resources? How do we move toward closing the income/job/ housing/wealth gap?

Elements of essential infrastructure:

- highways, transit, aviation, freight facilities
 - parks, trails, open spaces
 - sewer, water, public utilities
 - communications and information technology
- human capital

Elements of fair access:

inclusion

user friendly

ease of understanding

convenience

Elements of a closing gaps:

- partnerships: public, private, non-profits, foundations, institutions
- early childhood education
- access to technology, information

Framing Questions

6. If we achieve our vision, how will the region be different? What will it look like? (What does a fully built-out transit corridor system look like?)

Elements of the regional vision:

- range of housing types, densities and locations
- safe, walkable and vibrant neighborhoods
- healthy ecosystems and networks of natural resource corridors
- strong, regional economy and subregional/corridor micro economies

Framing Questions

7. What does "sustainable" mean to the Council? (Does it mean access to services, green space, jobs and safe housing?)

Elements of sustainability:

- access to infrastructure
- access to neighborhood services
 - access green spaces
- access to jobs
- access to safe housing
- access to clear air and water
