Background

On December 14, 2011, the Council approved an amendment to the 2011 Livable Communities Act Communities Act (LCA) Fund Distribution Plan that created a new category of Livable Communities Demonstration Account (LCDA) and Tax Base Revitalization Account (TBRA) grants, to begin the awarding of grants in early 2012 to support Transit Oriented Development (TOD) activities in several identified "TOD areas". These TOD areas consist of Department of Employment and Economic Development (DEED)-designated Transit Improvement Areas (TIAs), and other TIA-eligible station areas not yet designated by DEED, and other numerous locations on both high frequency bus local routes and high frequency express routes. For this first round of grant awards, \$8 million in LCDA and \$5 million in TBRA funds were made available.

The deadline for applications was February 15th. Applications were received for 29 projects in 12 communities totaling nearly \$23 million in both grant categories

Staff will present an overview of the application scoring and ranking process being undertaken by an inter-division/unit review committee consistent with the criteria set forth in the Fund Distribution Plan.

TOD Purpose

To demonstrate how increasing density around transit stations can reduce dependence on automobile ownership, vehicular traffic and associated parking requirements than would otherwise be necessary to support a similar level of more traditional development, and to encourage more transit ridership.


Eligible applicants and locations

- Cities or townships in the 7-county metro area participating in the LCA & their EDA/CDA/HRAs with project sites in eligible TOD areas:
 - Transit Improvement Areas (TIAs) designated by DEED, or TIA-eligible station areas along light rail, commuter rail or BRT operational by 2020;
 - Within one-quarter mile of any spot along a highfrequency local bus line; or
 - Within one-half mile radius of any bus stop or station on high-frequency express routes.

Evaluation process: Phase I — Threshold Criteria

- Must be in place now or have the applicant's commitment to be put in place within 36 months
- Applications meeting all threshold criteria move on to Phase II of the scoring process
 - Minimum residential density: 30 units/acre for LRT or 15 units/acre for bus or commuter rail
 - Minimum Floor Area Ratios (FAR): 1.5 for LRT or 0.5 for bus/commuter rail

Threshold criteria, cont.

- Official controls in place regarding TOD design criteria
 - × Minimal setbacks
 - × Short blocks
 - **▼** Optimal pedestrian convenience
 - **Range of housing densities, types & costs**
 - **×** Connections
 - Cycling & walking conveniences
 - **Employment opportunities**
 - Conservation/enhancement/protection of natural resources
 - Limited/shared commercial & residential parking

Threshold criteria, cont.

- If the application is cited as being jobs focused, 50 jobs/acre in employment centers in the TOD Area
- Equity considerations
 - × Preserve existing affordable housing
 - × Add affordable housing or higher value housing in lower income areas
- Consistency with city's comp plan
- Adoption of Corridors of Opportunity vision, goals & principals
- Capacity to enhance the tax base

Evaluation process: Phase II - Ranking

Ranking criteria

- The project's ability to produce affordable housing 0-10 pts
- Reduce reliance on automobiles & increase transit ridership 0-10 pts
- Create or preserve jobs 0-10 pts.
- City's Housing Performance Score 0-10 pts
- Affordability requirements 0-10 pts
- Formalized City TOD guidelines 0-5 pts
- Hiring & procurement goals that advance/promote employment of local workers and/or disadvantaged businesses 0-5 pts
- Existing funding commitments 0-5 pts
- Attract private investment 0-5 pts

Evaluation process: Phase II - Ranking

- Points allocation methodologies are documented in advance to assure consistency and relevance
- All team members review each application
- Each scoring member individually allocates preliminary points for each application for his/her area of expertise
- Scoring and advisory members meet to:
 - Discuss each application both at a high level and in detail
 - Review preliminary scoring and recommend changes
 - Finalize scoring

Evaluation process: Phase II - Ranking

- LCA staff tallies scores and provides a ranked matrix of the projects and their requested funding elements
- Scoring and advisory members review the matrix and finalize funding recommendations
- LCA staff present recommendations to CDC
- CDC recommends funding to full Council
