## BACKGROUND

The City of Apple Valley is located in Dakota County, surrounded by Eagan (north), Rosemount (east), Lakeville (south), and Burnsville (west).

The Metropolitan Council reviewed Apple Valley's 2020 Comprehensive Plan Update (Review No. 16963-1) on September 29, 1999. In 2000, the City had 45,527 people, 16,344 households and 1,250 jobs. By 2030, the City is expected to have 71,200 people, 27,500 households and 22,000 jobs.

The Council's 2030 Regional Development Framework identifies Apple Valley as a "Developed" community, which accommodates growth forecasts through reinvestment, at appropriate densities (5 units plus in developed areas), and targets higher density in locations with convenient transportation corridor access, and adequate sewer capacity.

The Metropolitan Disposal System serves Apple Valley through two regional wastewater treatment plants (WWTP). The Seneca WWTP serves the small, northwest part of the City, and the Empire WWTP serves the remaining part of the City.

#### **REQUEST SUMMARY**

On July 26, 2007, the Metropolitan Council received the City's comprehensive plan amendment (CPA) proposing to reguide 154 acres from Mixed use to industrial. The site is located north of County Road 42 and east of Galaxie Avenue.

#### PROPOSED ACTION

That the Metropolitan Council:

Allow the City to put the comprehensive plan amendment into effect with no plan modifications.

## **ISSUE ANALYSIS AND FINDINGS**

#### **REGIONAL SYSTEMS**

#### Parks (Jan Youngquist, 651-602-1029)

The proposed CPA is in conformance with the regional parks system, and will not substantially impact regional parks and trails.

#### Transportation (Ann Braden, 651-602-1705)

The proposed CPA is in conformance with the regional transportation (including aviation) system and will not substantially impact the regional transportation system.

#### Water Resources Management (Roger Janzig, 651-602-1119)

The proposed CPA is in conformance with the regional water resources management system and will not substantially impact the regional wastewater system. The Metropolitan Disposal System serving this area has adequate capacity for the proposed use.

Apple Valley is not a community having excessive peak hourly flow during wet weather events. However, the City should include a description of activities that identify and reduce excessive stormwater inflow and infiltration into the wastewater system in the City's 2008 comprehensive plan.

#### **REGIONAL POLICIES**

#### Surface Water Management (Jim Larsen, 651-602-1159)


The Vermillion River Watershed Joint Powers Organization and the Black Dog Watershed Management Organization oversee storm water management in the City of Apple Valley. In late 2006, the City submitted a draft local surface water management plan (LSWMP) to the Council and watersheds for review and comment. The City anticipated approving the final LSWMP in the summer of 2007. the Council requests that the City provide the Council a copy of the approved LSWMP in conjunction with the 2008 comprehensive plan update submittal.

#### Housing (Linda Milashius, 651-602-1541)

Although this amendment does not make any changes to specific Residential land use designations, the city is reminded that its' 1996-2010 housing goals if to be achieved, call for the addition of over 3,000 affordable ownership units and more than 500 affordable rental units before 2011.

Figure 1 – 2020 Planned Land Use and CPA Location Map




