Proposed Action

That the Metropolitan Council authorize the Regional Administrator to execute a grant agreement with SouthWest Transit (SWT) for up to \$350,000 for the mid-life rehabilitation of twenty large transit buses.

Background

Publicly funded vehicles with a useful life of twelve years or more, per the Council's Fleet Management Procedures adopted September 2010, are eligible for mid-life rehabilitation to include seat upholstery replacements, repair of uneven flooring, interior hardware (such as grab rails), privacy shields, seat frames, exterior paint, body work, lift overhauls, articulated joints and bus frames. SouthWest Transit is requesting the mid-life rehabilitation of eight 2001 and 2003 MCI coaches and twelve 2003 Gillig low-floor buses.

Rationale

Midlife rehabilitations are performed on vehicles to help reduce operating costs, which results in fewer breakdowns and minor repairs. The objective is to ultimately maintain or improve the physical condition of the vehicle, while maintaining or improving the service performance of the fleet.

Funding

This project will be funded with Regional Transit Capital (RTC) and is included in the 2011 Authorized Capital Program.
