### Report of the Community Development Committee

## 2012-113 City of Mound Comprehensive Plan Amendment, Pedestrian Mixed Use Review File No. 20438-2

CM Cunningham introduced this item and stated that as the committee was reviewing the Mound plan, there were many questions from committee members regarding the compatibility of local zoning with our comprehensive plans. In addition, he stated there were some testimonies from citizens, including the mayor that raised questions about the impact of this decision on affordable housing. Cunningham added that the committee recognized that as a new body they had not reviewed the guidance to staff with regard to review of these comprehensive plan amendments that were adopted by the previous Council. The committee had a split 5-4 vote.

Elkins expressed that the action being proposed today is the appropriate action and there is absolutely nothing wrong with the City of Mound's plan or zoning ordinances.

Munt stated that of all the comp plans that have come before her in the past year she has never heard from as many constituents as she did in this case. She said that many of the constituents were involved in creating Mound's comprehensive plan, and the construction of the Walgreen's would involve removing 15 affordable housing units.

It was moved by Cunningham, seconded by Rummel

"That the Metropolitan Council:

- 1. Adopt the attached review record and allow the City of Mound to put the Pedestrian Mixed Use comprehensive plan amendment (CPA) into effect.
- 2. Find that the proposed CPA does not change the City's forecasts.
- 3. Advise the City that it should make every effort to add the 15 affordable units lost, through this land use change, to its affordable housing need obligation between 2011 and 2020, meaning its share of the regional need would be a total of 83 units instead of 68."

### 2012-144 City of Rosemount, Comprehensive Plan Amendment, Greystone Subdivision, Review File No. 20584-4

It was moved by Cunningham, seconded by Wulff

"That the Metropolitan Council adopts the attached Advisory Comments and Review Record, and the following:

- 1. Adopt the attached review record and allow the City of Rosemount to put the Greystone Subdivision comprehensive plan amendment (CPA) into effect.
- 2. Find that the proposed CPA does not change the City's forecasts.
- 3. Advise the City that, if its proposed amendment is adopted in its current form, the City's comprehensive plan will not guide a sufficient amount land at densities that can: (a) ensure the City fulfills its obligations under the Metropolitan Land Planning Act to plan for and provide sufficient existing and new housing to meet the City's share of the metropolitan area's need for low- and moderate-income housing; and

- (b) ensure the City will meet its negotiated LCA goals for affordable and life-cycle housing through 2020.
- 4. Remind the City that Policy 3 of the 2030 Regional Development Framework states that the Council gives funding priority to communities and community projects that increase the variety of housing types and costs, appropriately mix land uses, increase transportation choices and leverage private investment."

# 2012-153 Central Corridor Light Rail Transit (Green Line): Additional Change Order Authority for the Operations and Maintenance Facility Contract

It was moved by Elkins, seconded by Kramer

"That the Metropolitan Council authorize an additional 2.5% (\$1,078,485) above the standard 5% (\$2,156,969) construction contract change order authority and the previously authorized 5% increase in change order authority (Business Item 2011-329 approved on December 14, 2011) for the Central Corridor (Green Line) LRT Operations and Maintenance Facility (OMF) Contract."

### Reports

Chair: Chair Haigh was out of state on this date.

### **Council Members**

Schreiber—Attended a public hearing for the Bottineau transit way at the Crystal Community Center. She stated that the efforts of the Corridors of Opportunity group are starting to show results, and many different ethnic groups were present and testified. Overall, the testimony showed support of the development of the transit way.

Elkins—Participated in a forum on Met Council transportation issues for the Bloomington League of Women Voters at the Bloomington Civic Plaza. Recorded a cable television show about transportation issues for the Richfield League of Women Voters. He has been closely following the affordable housing project in Richfield and attending their council and HRA meetings.

Munt—Reported to the cities along the SWLRT corridor about the first round of our LCDA TOD grants. All of the cities received the grant they applied for and are very grateful. Also bid farewell to John Gunyou who retired as City Manager of Minnetonka. Will be attending a meeting about the transportation study for the city of Minnetonka.

Smith—Attended the MnDOT meeting with CM Schreiber. Attended the transportation conference.

Rummel—Went to a ribbon cutting event in Centennial for their reuse of storm water program. They are collecting storm water and using it to irrigate their parks. Attended the Clean Water Council meeting, during which they heard presentations on and discussed storm water reuse.

Kramer—Invited Council members to an event on June 2 in Phalen Park for the rededication of a repaired bridge. Also invited members to the grand opening of the Lofts at Farmers Market on June 6.

Melander—Attended an informational meeting in Woodbury regarding a Met Council project and was impressed at the staff representation.

**Regional Administrator**—Stated that an application to DEED for SWLRT funds is likely, but the application is not yet available. Council members will continue to be informed on this process. Announced the retirement of Environmental Services General Manager, Bill Moore and introduced Moore's replacement, Leisa Thompson who is Deputy General Manager. Moore will continue to serve the Met Council as the Deputy General Manager half time for two years as Thompson transitions into her new role.
