INFORMATION

Discussion of CIP & Capital Program, Capital Budget, and Capital Finance Plan, Part 2

Jason Willett, ES Finance Director, reviewed the proposed capital finance plan, capital funding sources, and debt service. He stated that staff believes the financing load is reasonable. Bill Moeller, Assistant General Manager of Interceptor Services, explained the purpose and methods of the inspection program, the components of the interceptor system, and identified proposed rehabilitation projects.

Mid-Year Performance Report

William G. Moore, General Manager, Environmental Services, reported that ES is meeting or exceeding goals that it set for 2011. Highlights include: Plant performance is at 100% compliance; there have been zero odor complaints for the metro plant and only four odor complaints system-wide; key capital improvement projects have been implemented; an effective training program is in place for operator trainees; energy reduction goals have been met, and a new goal of 50% reduction by 2020 has been instituted. In response to a question from Council Member Đoàn, Moore indicated that the biggest foreseeable challenges are new regulations and the aging/changing workforce.

Business completed, the meeting adjourned at 5:13 p.m.
